Parents want arsenic-free drinking water for schoolchildren

FALLON, NV — Some parents here are demanding that school officials provide children with arsenic-free drinking water, but town leaders said that there is no need for that because the city will have a water treatment plant to remove

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the toxin in a year.

According to the *Reno Journal-Gazette*, parents, arsenic experts, lawmakers, activists and other critics said that if children can be prevented from drinking water containing poison, in schools or elsewhere, it should be done.

The city of Fallon has had problems concerning the high arsenic levels found in the area's water.

The US Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) already pushed back the deadline for the city to complete construction of a new water treatment plant from 31 May to 31 December of this year.

Fallon's drinking water has arsenic levels of 100 parts per billion (ppb), among the highest of any large public water system in the nation, officials say.

The EPA had been working with city officials to reduce arsenic in drinking water to the current federal standard of 50 ppb.

The agency has also decreed that the national standard for arsenic be lowered to 10 ppb by 2006.
