Dumping of mining waste into streams can continue, court rules

CHARLESTON, WV — A federal appeals court has overturned a ruling prohibiting the government from issuing permits to dispose of waste from mountaintop mining

operations into mountain streams.

The <u>Associated Press</u> (AP) said the decision released Wednesday said US District Judge Charles Haden's ruling last year restricting the US Army Corps of Engineers was overly broad.

The court sent the case back to Haden for further review, said AP.

The three-judge panel of the 4th US Circuit Court of Appeals also lifted the injunction Haden issued last year prohibiting the dumping, said the news service.

AP said the court's ruling marked the second time it has overturned decisions by Haden in litigation pitting mining companies against environmental groups.

Last May, Haden ruled the federal Clean Water Act outlaws most valley waste piles, and that a Bush administration proposal to allow such dumping was inconsistent with the law.

But the appeals court said that ruling reached beyond what Haden had been asked to consider, AP reported.

"None of the parties sought a declaration that the new rule was illegal or inconsistent with the Clean Water Act," the court said, according to the news service.

The decision released Wednesday "was not unexpected because we knew the 4th District is the most conservative appeals court in the country," said Patty Wallace, a member of Kentuckians for the Commonwealth, which opposes the dumping of mining waste, according to AP.

Bill Raney, president of the West Virginia Coal Association, praised the ruling, AP said.
